### THE PRESIDENT Johanna Johns

Rotary- CONNECTS THE WORLD This was the theme selected by the International President Mark Daniel Maloney as the Theme for this Rotary Year 2019-2020.

This year almost every board position was filled with a fully committed Executive Team and six Directors and five Service Chairs. But once again we were not able to fill the position Director of Fund Raising. For me it was important to carry on the work that IPP Greg Keighran commenced with filling all service chairs.

We had some outstanding results in the Youth Service Chair headed up by Melanie Lewis and the International Chair headed up by PE Niranjan Deodhar.

A new Community Project "Virtual Neighbours" ... (You are not alone) was created by Vinita Deodhar our Director of Membership. Vinita had a great understanding of her portfolio in as much as retention of members is far more



important and can be difficult if you don't have the projects to keep members engaged. I am very proud to announce in the year of rotary connects the world we managed to add 10 new members to our club this year, six Women and four Men with three new members under the age of 30.

It was important to me to have a strong and committed Rotarian at the helm of Projects and I was able to convince IPP Greg Keighran he was the right man for the job. Greg did an excellent job by having the right members heading up the committees for each project. The stand outs for me was the Carols held in December 2019 this committee was headed up by Madeleine Sherwood a fairly new member to the club, this young Lady will go places in Rotary having the up to date tech knowledge and organizational skills. A very enjoyable Carols and well patronised by our Locals and those who live a little further afield.

Having PE Niranjan Deodhar onboard two years in a row as our International Chair has made it possible for our Club to achieve a great result with 2 completed International Projects which we signed off on only a couple of weeks ago!

- 1. The Water & Sanitation project- 250 Toilets for Mewat (near Delhi) India, with a final result 300 toilets installed.
- 2. The construction of 9 Check Dams for water conservation in Bhiwandi, India this will give the farmers water for their crops in the dry season. 8 Check dams have been constructed the last one being held up due to the Coronavirus Pandemic restrictions.

My dear friend and fellow Rotarian Melanie Lewis has blown me away with what she has accomplished in the Youth Chair for her second year. We introduced a new youth scholarship which was driven by our passion to do something for our past member PP Bill Grant. We needed to get this inaugural education scholarship award off the ground whilst his widow Shirley Grant was still here to enjoy the appreciation we have for her husband as a fine human being and upstanding member of our community and a great Rotarian William Grant!

Melanie worked on our clubs involvement in many District Programs, including:-

Simply a great effort for our Club this year, Melanie had lots of help and support mostly from Greg Keighran and Madeleine Sherwood.

Other Members namely Amal Westacott, David Ellyard, Paul Young, Zenda Spry-Pohl, Bob Catherall, Mark Anderson, Dave Anderson and Russell Zimmerman were all involved in one or more of the Youth Programs.

Our Community Projects included our annual Spring Lunch for Seniors which was enjoyable and we need to thank Marion Zimmerman for once again providing the gift bags. We filled them with gifts provided by our retaillers and our community to give back to our Senior Citizens which they could take home which is so much appreciated.

Other projects like our Dress for Success where we ask our community to donate work clothing in good condition they no longer wear. This then gets sorted and all the great suits, dresses, skirts, blouses, shoes and bags are delivered to Dress for Success in Marrickville. All other clothing goes to Vinnies. Once again we need to thank Marion who did a awesome and efficient job with the sorting and Russell Zimmerman & Dave Sherwood for the delivery to Marrickville.

We again supported Taldumandi Youth Services this year by collating 250 shower packs with all the cosmetics provided by our community through collection. I would like to thank Anne Wright for all the collections and housing the stock till such time we were ready to sort and pack. This year we had some new members help with the sorting like Dee Habib and Roz Reynolds and our Youth Exchange Student Aleksandra Lammi, and our other community minded members in Cecil Cheng, Paul Young Also the other members on the day for delivery were Bob Catherall, Greg Keighran and Paul Young, we all drove out to North Sydney to deliver many boxes of shower packs.

We also supported Taldumandi Youth Services with our "Tree of Joy" display at Beecroft Place, the Christmas tree and all its decoration was erected by Bob Catherall, thanks Bob! This is such a great and easy project for us to do, as again all the new gifts and gift vouchers are all donated by our community.



Our Fund Raising projects like our annual book fair which our community looks forward to and responds to very quickly as soon as we open the doors to receive their used books.

The Book Fair has continued to improve each year for it's exposure on Social Media and our Flyers in Beecroft Village and of course our huge signs at the Village Green. This year we raised \$21,000.00 but we did have our doors open again to the second hand dealers early, so by the time the doors opened to the general public we already had substantial funds raised.

Then of course we had Andrew Sneddon back on the sales desk which also contributed to the increase in sales. Our specialty books table had great success with raising \$500.00 over and above the previous year, close to \$1,800.00.

The person I wish to thank for his creative work dressing the Scouts Hall year after year with such eye for detail is Bob Catherall, well done Bob we all appreciate the effort you put in to our Book Fair. Once again Zenda Spry-Pohl did a great job organising all our volunteers for the long job of sorting our books.

IPP Greg Keighran Project Director did such an amazing job getting everyone on board to take part in our annual book fair as there are many jobs that need doing to make this fund raiser a success.

Our other fund raiser the Christmas Raffle was a little down in fund raising to previous years, but as I always work in the old arcade I did definitely noticed the lack of shoppers this time leading up to Christmas. We usually have two spots in the old arcade but just not worthwhile this year. The new Beecroft Place is now where we should be, more people generating more funds.

Our Christmas Carols was so very enjoyable and we also erected our ShelterBox Tent to create extra interest. There were stalls to buy coffee and the scouts were there selling their BBQ sausages and the Girl Guides had their cakes etc. Our Friend of Rotary Kerrie Robson joined in and sang a few Christmas carols. Our own Dave Anderson did such a great job as MC I think he will most likely get this gig again!

Our final meeting for the year was our Christmas
Party at a Russell and Marion Zimmerman
house organised by Cathy Sherwood and her
committee. Great Food, wonderful entertainment lots of our members
had a very enjoyable night and way to end 2019.

The 2020 new vear presented us with many challenges, from the Drought, to the devastating Fires in NSW followed by the floods. We managed to come to a agreement and do Fundraiser for the NSW Fires by holding a BBQ



sausage sandwich sizzle in the Wongala car park.

Russell Zimmerman and Greg Keighran got to work and organized setting up the space. Mark Anderson quickly had some flyers designed and printed which were distributed around the Beecroft Shop Windows.

I was able to have a banner designed and donated by one of our local businesses.

As we also had to prepare for a very hot day we organised for two shelters to be donated for use on the day. We set up tables with all the leftover DVD and CD's from the bookfair. We gave away the sausage sandwich one per person and as many DVD or CD as they wanted and asked for a donation in return. We had 10 donation buckets spread around on the tables, we ended up raising just over \$2,000. on the day.

## TREASURER Russell Zimmerman

#### Report to the members:

I want to thank the members of Beecroft Rotary Club for once again allowing me to serve the club as treasurer. It has been a most rewarding and fulfilling position to hold in the club, now for my third year.

In presenting this report, it would be remiss of me not to thank several people for their help and support. I firstly would like to thank Maddy Sherwood for her support in setting up the weekly members list and making the calculations easy to attend to at the end of the meeting. I would also take this opportunity to thank Cathy Sherwood, who has ably assisted me at the desk in collecting money from the members and assisted in balancing the weekly funds each week. Greg Keighran has also assisted in reviewing the accounts for 2019 to the 2020 year, ensuring the accuracy of the final figures:

The book fair as one of the clubs major fundraising events, Maddy Sherwood was my assistant at the book fair, and her help in counting, bagging and writing deposits slips was much appreciated. It is interesting to see Maddy following in the steps of her grandparents as most members would be aware that Margaret and David Dart have been assisting with the book fair for many years. Margaret and David were sorely missed this year due to their travels interstate.

I want to thank the members, most who have moved to pay their dinner dues by credit or debit card, this makes the role of the treasurer far easier to manage. And I would encourage members to consider paying by card into 2020 to the 2021 year.

All credit card funds when received for fundraising activities are deposited to the General Account, we then make a transfer to the Project Account once the funds are cleared through the General Account

Another new initiative over the past twelve months has been the Quest Donation Tap Point. This was for a while in Dr. Whittle's surgery, more recently we have moved the terminal to Garry Choys (Denny's Pharmacy) in the arcade. Over the twelve months, we have processed approximately >\$1,000 through the Quest terminal, with a cost to operate the terminal at \$198.00.

During this year we have again been paying accounts by electronic funds transfer a number of the executive on the board have

obtained individual "banking dongles" for the account signatories which allows the payment of accounts or funds transfers to be set up and transferred at times to suit each signatory, this has reduced our reliance on cheques, with only one cheque being processed over the twelve months. All transactions still require two signatories at all times.

Again this year I have aimed to break down the expenditure in the Project Account showing the cost of running the project/event and then the donations to various charities/Rotary Projects as a separate amount.

Finally, I would like to wish Johanna Johns the very best after her year as President as she moves into a role with the district as a Assistant Governor, I wish to also thank the board for their support of me as treasurer. I look forward to continuing as treasurer during Niranjan's year.

On 14<sup>th</sup> December our Christmas Party was hosted at the Zimmermans. The Zimmermans and the Social Committee did an amazing job and it was a fabulous night. The Zimmerman family worked tirelessly before, during and after the event. A fabulous time was had by all.

#### **FOUNDATION**

**Director: David Rands** 

#### **Grant activity:**

Avenues of Service did not have the opportunity in their activities to take advantage of the benefit of using a Foundation Grant to subsidise club monetary input.

There was no District Grant activated, and our Global Grant activity was related to projects approved in previous years, the last being at the end of 2018-19.

We have three global grants still in progress.

- 1. GG 1861902 Toilets and training in sanitation in Mewat, Haryana, India. \$US80,454. The original project of building 250 toilets was completed in 2019. Money saved allowed a further 50 toilets to be constructed, so these were commenced, but unable to be completed due to the Covid-19 shutdown. Hopefully these will be completed in due course. The Foundation is making allowances for projects being late on account of the Covid-19 pandemic. Project a joint venture with South Delhi Metropolitan RC (Manjit Sawhney), but funding has been supported by Crows Nest club and several other districts contributing DDF.
- 2. GG 1982956 Check Dams in Murbad and Bhiwandi Taluks, Maharasha State, India. Beecroft and Link Town clubs are the lead partners; again we have had DDF support from other districts. 8 out of 9 dams were completed on time in 2019, but this project was then interrupted, first by heavy seasonal rains, and then by Covid-19. An Interim report has been completed that indicates our position.
- GG 2001230 Covid-safe latrines in Mewat, India. This grant covers latrines in individual homes in Mewat. This is a \$US60797 project and the grant has been submitted to TRF and is awaiting approval. We have budgeted to provide \$US4725 to this project.

#### **Giving:**

Our giving is significantly reduced this year - (\$US 26111.36 vs LY \$US 42356.85 - this figure includes the \$5275 for the check dams GG. Polio giving was up this year from \$US 3700 to \$US4845. With Dave and Mark Anderson leading the Polio Train ride again we were able to attract good levels of donations. The Annual Fund giving was down from \$US 32500 to \$US 21300. This is largely explained by our drop in PHS members from 11 to 6 in the year. The Paul Harris Society is open to all club members, friends and family who commit to donating \$US1000 per annum to the Rotary Foundation.

Centurions. We are pleased that our club has 31 Centurions – Rotarians who have donated \$A100 or more during the Rotary year. This is a strong amount of support; however, we will work hard in the coming year to encourage newer members to take part in this easy way to support or Rotary Foundation. It is our donations which allow us to partake in the sort of grant projects noted above – where in every case the multiplication of our own club money is substantial in enabling us to do so much good in the world.

#### **Promotional activity:**

Speakers / Sessions on TRF in the club. We are particularly fortunate having Mark Anderson's assistance in providing several speakers on the Rotary Foundation during the year. We are expected to host one district address each year on the Foundation, but we have enjoyed more than that.

We Look forward to further Foundation information sessions and talks during the coming year.

#### Virtual Neighbours

This community enterprise initiative was conceived, implemented and driven by Beecroft Rotarian, Vinita Deodhar. This is her report on the project:

"I April we launched *Rotary Virtual Neighbours*. It addresses loneliness and isolation in our community by enabling Rotary volunteers to make regular virtual visits to service recipients over the phone or internet. The conversation is similar in tone and content to a neighbourly chat over the backyard fence.

The challenge of social isolation was made even more pressing as we face the COVID-19 pandemic. While *Rotary Virtual Neighbour* commenced during COVID-19, it is an ensuring free service that will continue beyond the social distancing times of the pandemic.

In establishing the need and designing the service, we have worked closely with our local community, like doctors, pharmacists and managers of aged care homes. The advisors have also provided us with referrals to top up the word-of-mouth outreach by Rotarians in our club.

We started the pilot in April. The project team in our club actively recruits recipients and volunteers, matches their profiles, and provides induction and support for the volunteers. A code of conduct and risk management framework has been put in place.

#### INTERNATIONAL SERVICE

#### Chair: Niranjan Deodhar

This year saw a continuation of our recent trend of one new multiyear global grant project each year, that we fund and help direct the money to a good cause around the globe.

1. From 2017-18 - Construction of toilets for improved access to sanitation - Mewat, India. Club contribution - \$7K, project outlay including grant multipliers - \$100K.

This project is now nearing completion. In fact, one could say it is complete when compared to the original scope of 250 toilets that have been constructed and handed over. During that process, due to delays attributed to pollution controls mandated by the Government of India, the funds remained unused for a while and accrued some interest income. As a result, an additional 50 toilets could be funded. This additional construction is also now complete, pending final inspection and hand over as soon as the pandemic restrictions are lifted. A detailed report was provided to the club upon completion of the original scope – some excerpts from that report:



2. From 2018-19 – Construction of check dams for water conservation - Bhiwandi, India. Club contribution - \$7K, project outlay including grant multipliers - \$42K.

This project is also nearing completion, with 8 of the 9 dams constructed and ready to take in rain water during this year's monsoons expected in a few weeks. The 9<sup>th</sup> and last dam has been halted due to pandemic restrictions. We were hoping to complete it as soon as these restrictions are lifted, however given that's unlikely before the monsoons, construction will probably have to wait for the rains to recede later in the year. An interim report was provided to the club – some excerpts from that report:



3. For 2019-20, we have agreed to fund a second round of toilets in Mewat by contributing \$7.5K, for which the global grant application process is under way. The grant is expected to move fast under the COVID-19 fast-track process, given toilets and sanitation availability within homes becomes even more pertinent in the time of social distancing.

We will remain on the lookout for more such opportunities in future and align our commitments to our ability raise funds.



ShelterBox is a cutting-edge charity that hand-delivers emergency shelter for families devastated by natural disaster and conflict. Our signature ShelterBoxes and ShelterKits contain the tools to transform lives and rebuild communities.

In 2019 ShelterBox assisted over 29,000 families, equivalent to more than 145,000 people. We have responded to world events 11 times, in 9 different countries.

#### 1) District programs

#### RYLA
