THE PRESIDENT Greg Keighran

Rotary – Be The Inspiration. This was the theme selected by Rotary International President Barrie Rassin as his theme for this Rotary year.

This year, our Club has been in transition with the moving from the Pennant Hills Golf Club under renovation to our current venue Pennant Hills Bowling would Club and like acknowledge Cathy Sherwood and Russell Zimmerman for this transition managing in venue which has resulted in reduced weekly cost to members

This year I elected not to have a specific Fund Raising and Projects Directors on this year's Board but to encourage the participation of the Avenue of Service Chairs to step up and attend Board Meetings. This I believe has worked particularly



well with our Projects being repeated from last year and Fund Raising following on from last year being controlled by the Chairs and other Board Members rather than one specific Director.

As individuals, we all join a Rotary Club in the hope that in doing so we can make a difference to someone's life. We not only made a difference to the people of Beecroft but also to many unknown individuals overseas through our success in finalising the Dialysis Equipment Installation and Training at Lautoka Hospital - Fiji Global Grant, continuing the Mewat – India Global Grant begun last year and applying for a Check dams for Water Conservation – Bhiwandi, Maharashtra – India Global Grant from the Rotary Foundation.

Our members continue to be strong supporters of The Rotary Foundation and this year we have contributed nearly \$46,000 from both Club and personal giving. This year, we are currently the second highest overall contributor to The Rotary Foundation in our District.

In August 2018, we ran a very successful Book Fair. In terms of fundraising, this year has built on the successful year in 2017-18 with \$19,300 raised and this I believe was because of our continued marketing through Facebook that attracted increased donations and interest in the local and wider community.



We continued with the Melbourne Cup Trifecta tickets selling which brought an additional \$2,600 in fund raising and thanks to all those members who sold and purchased tickets.

Our second major fund raiser, our Christmas Raffle was undertaken over a five (5) week period leading into Christmas and contributed over \$9,300 to our fund-raising efforts.

In September 2018 we held the Spring Lunch for Seniors and Retirees at the Pennant Hills Bowling Club. The entertainment, the gift bags and decoration of the room all delivered a great day out for our more senior community members and a very big thank you to Anne Wright and Johanna Johns for their organisation.





We supported Mark and David Anderson with the Ride to End Polio where they raised in the order of \$240,000 which was tripled by the Bill and Melinda Gates foundation to \$720,000 for the continued work in the Eradication of Polio from the Planet.

Our Carols on the Village Green in early December 2018 continues to deliver great community engagement and by the numbers of people that attended, it would appear that this year was the biggest in a very long time. I think the weather and the marketing combined to deliver an outstanding Beecroft community event.

For our Youth, we continue to provide support for the Debating Awards to a girls and boy at Beecroft Public School, sent Keeley Clarke on Youth Exchange to Switzerland, Science and Engineering Challenge, we sponsored a MUNA team from Cherrybrook Technical High School, one (1) RYLA awardee and two (2) students from Loreto to attend Summer RYPEN, one student from Arden to Winter RYPEN, two (2) Ethics Award for medical students at the SAN Hospital – University of Sydney medical school.

We have also committed out Club to running our districts MUNA 2020 – 2022.

We also supported the Inala Golf Day in May 2019 by sponsoring a Hole and a team and provided a number of our members and former members to assist in the organisation and running of the day was much appreciated with what was a major fundraising success for Inala.

Public Image continued to impress with three (3) shop window displays in the Place Shopping Centre in Beecroft,

Special thank you to Anne Wright and Bob Catherall for their time and effort in putting these displays together.

Our Club brochure and copies of Rotary Down Under have a permanent stand within the Place in Beecroft Shopping Centre and our Facebook page and our new Club website. All of this activity has given what we do more exposure to the residents of Beecroft and surrounding areas, than we have ever had.

The delivery of a strategic plan in 2017-18 was another outstanding achievement in the previous year and special thanks to David Ellyard in seeing this through the process. The Board is reviewing our Clubs progress in relation to the Plan in the June 2019 board meeting

In terms of fellowship, we continue to offer a very strong speaker program that is of value to our members. If we use our attendance at our weekly meetings as a measure, then the program offered is a measure of our success.

Membership is always a strong indicator of the health of our Club and we have grown our Club by three (3) with Melanie Lewis, David Anderson and Madeleine Sherwood all aged below 40 and lost one (1) with PP Bob Adcock passing.

All credit card funds are deposited to the General Account and then a transfer is made to the project account as and when required after funds are received for the project account.

During this year we have been able to move to pay accounts by electronic funds transfer a number of the executive on the board have obtained individual "banking dongles" for the account signatories which allows the payment of accounts or funds transfers to be set up and transferred at times to suit each signatory, this has reduced our reliance on cheques. All transactions still require two (2) signatories at all times.

We used one organic post on Facebook which was shared out to our local community and it received a reach of 29.2K viewers......fabulous public image for our Club and the work we do! This post still stands as the best performing post for our Club since its inception onto Facebook. Having more drop off addresses I believe is the key tool, as it allowed us to market to a wider audience which had a huge impact on the reach we received. Thank you to everyone who helped with the collection, packing and delivery.



Social Media and the Internet

Facebook has once again exceeded expectations. Key points are:-

Page Likes = 1,025

Engagement = 10,635 (how many clicks, comments and shares we received)

Reach = 126,746 (the number of people our posts reached, therefore our name and the brand)

The most popular Facebook posts this year were Taldumande, Dress for Success, End Polio Now Train Ride, Rotary We Do Good Poster.

Instagram is making slow progress and requires more work to be done on this platform in the coming 12 months to expand our reach and followers to attack a younger audience.

Our website is now one year old and most of the fine tuning of the site that the public can view has now been completed. Public viewing is on the increase with the average person visiting 7.45 of our website pages each visit. As a result of the increase visits, the number of people subscribing to our public newsletter is also building therefore I will bring the launch of this newsletter for the public forward to September 2019.

Looking further forward, more work will also be done in the coming year to pull in the local businesses and community groups to join us on our site, our members on the back end and we will also work with fury to ensure we have a steady flow of new stories hit our pages.

This year the public image was successful as we once again increased our visuals at all our events, on social media and once more sponsored events such as Inala, where all 200 players from different corporate sectors received our Club's brochure.

THE ROTARY FOUNDATION



The Rotary Foundation is an intrinsic part of our Rotary movement, where while Rotary International is responsible for Administration and Leadership globally, the Rotary Foundation is our charitable arm, responsible for raising Funds and distributing them highly effectively to Educational and Humanitarian projects around the world. It consistently is rate in the top few charities in the world based on its governance standards and its effectiveness in using the donated dollar to make the world a better place.

Our club is the second most generous club in the District thanks to our regular club donations, and the high number of Centurions and 11 Paul Harris Society members, who give very generously. In particular, we have 7 Major donors which demonstrates the value our members see in the Rotary Foundation.

Our donations at the May end of total \$46,000 AUD, against our record giving of over \$65,000 AUD last year. Last vear's figure included club shares of two alobal grants amounting to \$14.000 AUD, so even though we are still a little behind we may well match last year's giving across the Annual Fund and the Fnd Polio Fund

Late September 2018,
Mark and Dave
Anderson ran a
promotion for End Polio
by organising to visit all
metropolitan and
suburban stations in a



single day. This promotion was well supported by our club and many other clubs across the two Sydney districts, and raised a total of \$240,000 including a bequest from an Estate through Belrose Rotary, which will be repeated this year and will be also run in Melbourne and possibly New Zealand.

We have actively been using the Foundation to support club projects, in particular our two global grant International projects – our Supply of Dialysis equipment to the Lautoka Hospital in Fiji, now complete, and the building of toilets in the village of Mewat, just south of New Delhi, India.

Both projects have been highly successful and have saved lives and improved the quality of life for disadvantaged people in those countries. The combined value of these projects is over \$200,000 AUD thanks to our initiative. Thanks to Ilyas Yaseen and Val Parmar for their leadership in Fiji, and Niranjan Deodhar for the effective delivery of the toilets in Mewat.

Closer to home we have used a District grant to supply \$6000 worth of special chairs for Inala, and we thank Anne Wright for pushing this project through on behalf of the club. By using the Rotary Foundation we have doubled our Club contribution of \$3000.

INTERNATIONAL SERVICE Chair: Niranjan Deodhar

This year saw our project in Toilet and Sanitation project in Mewat, Haryana (India) move forward with TRF approval, and the beginnings of a new grant application for check dams in Bhiwandi, Maharashtra (India).

Toilets Installation and Sanitation Training in Rural Mewat, Haryana, India

Rotary Club of Beecroft is partnering with Rotary Club of South Delhi Metro to improve health and sanitation outcomes in rural Mewat, in the state of Haryana in India. Provision of toilets for rural communities is also in line with the Government of India's Clean India campaign and has been recognised as a critical element of improving health and sanitation for families and providing dignity for women in particular. A number of Rotary Districts across Australia, India, New Zealand and the US, as well as Rotary Club of Crows Nest have contributed valuable funds into this Global Grant Project.




As at the end of last year, we had just commenced working with the host club in India – over this year the project moved forward with TRF approval, followed by construction of bulk of the toilets completed as of April 2019. A total of 250 toilets will be completed by July of this year.

During a visit in December, club members Niranjan and Vinita Deodhar

met with many of the residents of Ghasera and Nuh. In both places, and across all the houses we visited, we were greeted with enthusiasm and thanks for the work being done. It was obvious from the personal stories narrated by the residents that access to basic hygiene had made a big difference to the health and dignity of everyone, in particular the women of the village. I met an old lady who was visual impaired. Before her house was provided with a toilet, she used to walk slowly for 30 minutes each way, while assisted by a family member, to get to a spot in the fields where she could have some measure of privacy. Vinita spoke to women folk of a number of households and reported similar themes.



We inspected toilets that had been recently built as well as those built in previous rounds to ensure that on-going maintenance and usage was as desired. Previously built toilets were in good condition and had all the signs of being maintained and being in use. The current project is expected to be complete by July 2019. About 90% of the houses in the selected villages will have been covered by then. This is through a combination of Rotary projects, government initiatives, and some relatively well-off households taking the initiative to invest on their own, in response to the progress they see around them.



Check dams for water conservation – Bhiwandi, Maharashtra, India

- Rotary Club of Link Town Airoli (D3142), just east of Mumbai is the host club and will contribute funds from their side as well.
- Check dams are small barriers (a few meters long) constructed on creeks and established water run-off routes. They are known to help hold rain water long enough for better replenishment of the water table, and also provide for a second crop. Income lifts in such investments are significant, to the tune of just one year of income lift paying back the capital costs. There are allied health benefits as well.
- Each dam costs around \$5K; and we propose to build around 10 in one GGP. A needs and sustainability assessment has been prepared and will be detailed in the GGP application.
- Beecroft has agreed to contribute \$5K; plus we have approached our district for DDF as well to match that amount.
