

# TREASURER'S REPORT

# Russel Zimmerman

The Treasurer's report shows the club accounts' estimated position as of 30 June 2023.

Please note that the submitted accounts are in draft form only. These accounts are based on actual receipts and expenditures from 1 July 2022 to 8 June 2023, and estimates of income and spending to 30 June 2023. It is unlikely that there will be any material change in the figures by the year-end.

As all members pay a weekly administration fee and purchase their meals, no significant changes to the General Account will be made. As the bookshop trades each week, we expect a further \$2,000 in income to the Project account.

As the Rotary Club of Beecroft Pre-Loved Bookshop Coordinator, I would like to thank the community volunteers and the members of the Club that have assisted at the bookshop. In evaluating the income for the year, the income was derived from four main activities:

- Bookshop Income \$52,409.86
- Christmas Raffle \$8220.10
- Profit from the sale of Beecroft Spirit Gin \$ 2827.78
- Young @ Heart Event \$1,813.00

Unfortunately, due to having to relocate the bookshop in April 2023, there was a significant amount of Capital Expenditure in fitting out the bookshop in its new location.



### **General Account**

The year commenced with an opening balance of \$2,932.78, and we should finish the year with an amount of \$5,400 carried forward to the new Board. Expenses still to be paid are \$300 to Centurion Fund and an allowance of \$1,000 subsidy for Changeover.

# **Project Account**

We commenced the year with an opening balance of \$16,585.33, and we expect to hand over to the incoming Board an amount of \$18,328.61. Accounts yet to be paid are:

- Bookshop rent for May \$490.17
- Bookshop rent for June \$500.00, approximately
- RYPEN Timor \$6,600
- Income Bookshop three weeks in June \$2,000.00
- ANZAC Wreaths Invoiced income not received of \$420.00

The current Board has committed funds for the following projects, however these will not need to be paid after the 30th June.

- West Pennant Hills Rotary Global grant request \$4,500
- Beecroft Global Grant \$2,000
- Vocational Awards evening \$2,000

This gives a total of \$8,500, further commitments, allowing the new Board approximately \$12,000 to commence their year. Details of the Club's income and expenditure for the project account appear on next page.

Further funds were raised at the Youth Awards which offset the Youth Awards expenditure by approximately \$1,550.00.

The club has 8 Paul Harris Society members (\$US 1000 per annum), 9 Major Donors (gifts totalling over \$US10,000), 5 bequest society members (\$US 10,000 in your will for the Foundation)

We have 27 Centurions from our membership of 37 which is very good. However, 100% Centurion support is the Club's objective. Thank you to those who contribute.

To date our overall contributions to the Annual Fund will be down a little from last year due to lower club membership.

Project activity this year has not directly accessed our District's Designated Fund for new District Grants.

We are working with West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook and other clubs to support a project constructing toilets in India and Indonesia.

Earlier Global grants completed were in India supporting the construction of a voice and speech clinic, two vision centres, and youth training programs in Fast Timor.

Our total contribution as a club was about AUD 12000.

We will also present 5 Paul Harris Fellow recognitions at our changeover on 25th June, three to club members and two to people for outstanding community service.

# YOUTH SERVICE REPORT

# **Daniel Dummer**

Beecroft Rotary broadened our Youth Service in 2022–23 with new opportunities for young people, while partnering with a wide range of local organisations to deepen our engagement with youth audiences. Highlights included hosting two rounds of Beecroft Youth Awards, launching the Beecroft Youth Scholarship, and establishing the successful Beecroft Spirit Gin fundraiser. These initiatives give practical support for young people to develop career skills and networking opportunities through community service, while strengthening our club's local relationships and public image.

# Giving practical support for young achievers

Youth engagement kicked off with our Youth Awards on 15 August 2022, with presentations for Volunteer of the Year, Apprentice of the Year, the Bill Grant Memorial Prize, and a range of Community Leader awards. Guest speaker Genevieve Langron shared how lessons she first learned at RYLA continue to shape her career, including in advising NSW Health during the pandemic response. About 60 people including club members, award recipients, families, friends and school staff were present for this special club meeting. Thank you to committee members Sophie Lloyd and Christian Kirkendall for their hard work.



Youth Awards were planned again for Sunday 30 April 2023 to align with Youth Week and to allow Year 12 recipients to include the awards in their applications for early entry to university. Instead of forming an internal committee, a team of local students and alumni – Sofia Guistini, Jaime Pitcher, Georgiana Dumapit, Shabdha Kukunooru, and Hasti Rostami – collaborated to deliver a truly youth–led event. Their vision included a community afternoon tea to promote mingling, new award categories focussed on passions and careers, and practical prizes – such as mentorships and experiences – to help students take genuine steps towards their goals. Their insights and networks proved invaluable, generating 43 award nominations (compared to 12 previously) and deepening our relationships with local schools.

These awards became an even greater success than before, recognising 12 students in 9 categories, while bringing together 120 guests and over a dozen community groups as sponsors or supporters for the event. The Golden Kangaroos Concert Band performed musical numbers, Beecroft Guides and Loreto student Millie Hadwen provided catering, and guest speaker Nina Gbor enthralled everyone with her insights on sustainable fashion. Prizes spanned a wide range of passion areas, including journalism (having an article published in local paper *The Post*), entrepreneurship (mentor session with Enactus Australia), and sport (6 months membership at Snap Fitness Beecroft and consult with an EducationUSA college expert). All prizewinners also received a copy of *The New University Entry Game* by Art of Smart Education.

Both awards ceremonies were featured in *The Post*, and the second event particularly strengthened our club's local ties by bringing Rotary "to the community." Organic social media posts on Instagram, LinkedIn and Facebook spurred thousands of impressions. District Governor Mina Howard also attended and spoke glowingly of our work, including in her district update and in a toast to Beecroft Rotary at her own club.











# **Building new pathways for youth service**

Young people are typically motivated to make a difference, and they seek opportunities to volunteer which are social, impactful, and align with their values. Unfortunately they can face barriers such as cost and time commitment which limit their engagement with Rotary. This year, we trialled a novel "scholarship" approach to efficiently help young leaders to get involved in community service, while building an informal relationship with our club. The Board designated \$900, representing the equivalent of 5 x half-yearly membership dues, towards a youth project to be designed and delivered by a team of selected young leaders. This program was launched at the most recent Youth Awards, and a team of "Beecroft Youth Scholars" has been convened to plan a project to be delivered in the new Rotary year.



# Raising funds by raising a glass: Beecroft Spirit Gin

In a novel approach to fundraising, Beecroft Rotary partnered with Craft Foundry to create Beecroft Spirit Gin, a small-batch gin distilled with strawberry gum, lemon myrtle and rosella to reflect the flora of Beecroft.

After designing a label and hosting a tasting night to confirm the recipe, we hosted a rousing launch party at Hannah's Wine Bar & Restaurant in Beecroft Place, attended by over 150 guests and extensively engaging local business leaders and organisations. The gin was also stocked in Hannah's, The Verandah and Molly's Pavillion by agreement with Norths Collective. All 260+bottles sold, raising \$2,649.78 for club projects.



In addition to coverage in *The Post*, the project was also covered in the global Rotary Magazine. Commemorating the club's 50th anniversary, Julian Leeser MP also cited Beecroft Spirit Gin, alongside the Preloved Bookshop and other club projects, in a 90 second Member Statement in Federal Parliament. The gin has been remarkably popular, with feedback from Molly's Pavillion indicating community interest in another batch.

A massive thank you to committee members Cathy Sherwood, Russell Zimmerman, Madeleine Sherwood, Dave Anderson, David Ellyard and Zenda Spry-Pohl, as well as extensive support and advice from Niranjan Deodhar, and a huge club effort in promoting gin – and club membership – on the launch night!



# Investing in life-changing Rotary experiences for young people

This year we were delighted to sponsor outstanding candidates for major Rotary youth programs: Stella Jeong (Year 12, James Ruse Agricultural High School) attended the National Youth Science Forum, Maddy Johnson attended the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA) at Knox Grammar School, and Ben Jepsen completed the RYLA Oceania ELEVATE Program. All visited our club as guest speakers and spoke of the transformative impact they experienced through these programs. Maddy and Ben are also veteran facilitators at Summer RYPEN, so we were glad to invest further in their development as leaders. In addition, two students from Mount St Benedict College, Luella Negron and Ava Bizzanelli, attended Winter RYPEN, which made a welcome return after a three-year covid-19 hiatus.



Beecroft Rotary also continued to support the Beecroft Public School Public Speaking Competition in September 2022, providing topics and helping to judge the grand final (thank you Russell!). The four top-scoring speakers (a boy and girl in each of Year 5 and 6) visited our club meeting on 14 November

with their families to present their speeches, and receive \$15 vouchers for the Preloved Bookshop! The following month, we were invited to present the Public Speaking Award to Katia Hales at the school's Year 6 Graduation.

In October 2022 we also hosted a fantastic student debate between Cheltenham Girls High School and Knox Grammar School. All speakers gave well-researched and engaging speeches on the topic, regarding the practice of *damnatio memoriae*, and victory was awarded via audience vote to the negative team, Knox.

Finally, we sought opportunities throughout the year to further strengthen key relationships. Daniel visited Hills Rotaract as a guest, the Rotary Club of Dee Why Warringah as a speaker, and met with teachers at Mount St Benedict and Arden to continue exploring opportunities for partnership.

Thank you to all club members who helped support our many youth programs and initiatives this Rotary year!

The key event within the 2022-23 vocation remit was International Women's Day. The club celebrated this event across two weeks with two excellent guest speakers.

On 6 March, 2022 Strathfield Citizen of the Year Saroni Roy spoke of gender and racial inequality, and the establishment of the Saroni Roy Foundation.

On 13 May, the current club President Madeline Sherwood gave an overview of International Women's Day, women in Rotary, and her personal experiences. Madeleine's presentation sparked an engaged discussion amongst members, which included the introduction of women into the club in 1989. Madeleine and the club acknowledged their first female member, Denise Layton.

While the event itself has been delayed until the 2023-24 year, planning for the Vocational Awards night occurred during 2022-23. In addition to Pride of Workmanship, the awards were expanded to include a small business category and the Geoff Goldman Apprentice Grant, which previously sat within the Youth Awards. This change was made to focus the Youth Awards on school age students, and bring the grant within the other awards that focus on a demonstrated excellence within a profession.

# Serving our global communities

Building on the work of the last few years, we initiated and completed a global grant project in partnership with the Global Wizards club of District 3150 in India. This project created two vision centres in collaboration with a renowned super speciality hospital, and Operation Eyesight, a Canadian NGO specialising in this subject. The vision centres will service two towns and help alleviate the risks of preventable blindness through subsidised early detection and intervention.

The club held joint meetings through Zoom with other partner clubs from previous year's global projects, for example the voice and speech clinic in Pune, India, and heard directly from the medical professionals on the ground who operate the equipment.

We have initiated more global projects to construct toilets in India as well as in Indonesia, which are expected to come to fruition in the coming year. The Indonesian project is in partnership with our neighbouring club of West Pennant Hills Cherrybrook. On the theme of collaborating with neighbouring clubs, we have sponsored one batch of trainees in the Rotary Youth Program of Enrichment (RYPEN) in Timor Leste, run by RC Pennant Hills.

Our Club has a clear and robust diversity policy which we value. Contributions to our Club, both monetary and in- kind, come from people of all different backgrounds of, which we highly value.
